Vedanta Balbahadur is founding principal of Studio Vedanta Balbahadur, a transdisciplinary practice involved in architecture, planning, photography, exhibition design, and graphic design. He is a licensed architect and a studio coordinator and instructor at the McGill University Peter Guo-hua Fu School of Architecture. In addition to design studios, he has for the past decade conducted courses, seminars, and city tours about art, culture, and the built environment for architects and nonarchitects in the belief that the next generation of clients can have a more positive impact on their communities by being better informed; these have included groups from the Netherlands, Brazil, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, South Korea, and India. His course Physical Environment, Sustainability, and Contemporary Culture at the McGill University School of Continuing Studies is specifically tailored for students from diverse majors and introduces them to key concepts in architecture, art, design, and the urban environment. He sees the role of engaging laypeople in discussions about design as an essential part of professional practice because cities will be better when clients and builders appreciate the value of good design and the role that architects play in attaining it.

Ra'anaa Brown was born and raised on the traditional unceded lands of the Anishinabek, Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee and Ojibway/Chippewa peoples, in Brampton, Ontario. She received her Bachelors of Architectural Studies and Masters of Architecture at Laurentian University's McEwen School of Architecture. Her thesis, entitled *The Architectural Segregation of Chicago: Black Identity in the South Side*, laid the foundations for her passion for the intersection of art and activism, coined artivism. She further explores this with ardour in her capacity as Chair of Black Lives Matter Sudbury and Installation Coordinator for Up Here: Urban Arts Festival. Ra'anaa has participated in and curated numerous artivist initiatives and has contributed her talents to the development of many Afrocentric artistic installations. She has taken on many leadership roles, as an artist, activist and academic creating space for people of colour and continually promoting anti-racist practices and social justice. A cultural curator and visual activist, Ra'anaa is currently pursuing her PhD research on the emergence of Black arts and activism in N'Swakamok, at Concordia University in Tio'tia:ke, on the unceded Kanien'kehá:ka traditional territory.

<u>Chris Basiw</u> is an OAA intern architect with <u>Centreline Architecture</u>, a MSoA graduate in the MArch program at Laurentian University and a sessional first-year design studio instructor at the MSoA. Garnered with the Social Engagement Award for his SSHRC-funded thesis, entitled *The Potential of Architecture to Address Homelessness in Northern Ontario*, he continues his thesis work in the north, working on innovative, affordable housing projects in professional practice and studying the need for affordable housing in Sudbury. In addition, he engages with local volunteer organizations and develops programs for architecture students in Sudbury to be involved in the local community.

Clara James is the founder of Black Students in Design (BSD). As a recent graduate of the Daniels Undergraduate Architecture program, she was compelled to create a space for Black students to feel safe, welcome, and inspired to continue their post-secondary education in architecture and design. It has been two years since she founded the club and, in that time, they have hosted social and educational events specifically for Black students at the Daniels Faculty. She led the Building Black Success Through Design (BBSD) program; a mentorship and design program created by Black Daniels students for Black high school students. Through the framework of a design competition, BBSD guided Black students interested in architecture and design through a series of workshops with mentors to create their submission. The initiative aims to increase diversity in the design disciplines.

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Vincent Hui is associate professor of architecture at Toronto Metropolitan University, teaching design, multimedia, and digital fabrication. He is also Associate Chair of Experiential Learning and Co-operative Education for the Department of Architectural Science. He holds an MBA from York University, a BES and M.Arch from the University of Waterloo.

Kai Wood Mah is a design historian. OAQ licensed architect and associate professor at the McEwen School of Architecture at Laurentian University. A co-founder of the design research practice Afield https://www.afield.ca/ his architectural practice is multidisciplinary and grounded in site-specific investigations, employing archives, fieldwork, social science methodologies, and research-creation. His writings have appeared in Visual Studies, Public, African Identities, Children, Youth and Environments, Space and Culture, and Interventions among other peer-reviewed journals as well as collected volumes. He is a member of the founding faculty at Laurentian University's School of Architecture.

Ozavr Saloojee is associate professor at the Azrieli School of Architecture and Urbanism, Carleton University, Born and raised in Johannesburg, South Africa, Professor Saloojee previously taught at the University of Minnesota's College of Design, where, in addition to his teaching in the School of Architecture, he was appointed the University of Minnesota's 2014-2016 Imagine Chair in the Arts, Design and Humanities and served as affiliate faculty in Landscape Architecture and in the Religious Studies Program. Before moving to the USA in 2005, he studied, taught and practiced architecture in Ottawa, receiving his B.Arch and Post-professional M.Arch II (Theory and Culture) from Carleton University. He completed his doctoral research at the Bartlett School of Architecture (University College London).

Nene Brode is the Manager of External Relations and Outreach in the Dean's Office the at Daniels Faculty of Architecture, Landscape and Design. With graduate studies in Communications and Culture at Ryerson University (now Toronto Metropolitan University), Nene also worked there as an administrator with the Department of Architectural Science, the Office of the Provost Research and Innovation and Graduate Studies at the Dean's Office in the Faculty of Engineering and Architectural Science. In 2016, she founded the V4Lab, a summer youth STEAM program after establishing the architectural science day camp. From working on the development of the Digital Media Experience Lab. to creating the V4Lab youth camp program showcasing work at the Ontario Science Centre, Nene has been a connector and collaborator fostering community engagement. Her outreach efforts earned her the Julia Hanigsberg Make Your Mark Staff Award for Community Engagement.

Diogo Burnay is Associate Professor and Director of the School of Architecture at Dalhousie University. He is co-founder of CVDB arquitectos based in Lisbon and has worked, taught and lectured also in Hong Kong, Macau and Europe. He graduated in Architecture from the Faculdade de Arquitetura da Universidade de Lisboa and holds a Master's from the Bartlett, University College London. His design and research focus on architecture and the public realm, investigating the active role of architecture in a broader social, cultural, economic, and political landscape. His work explores and emphasizes the public relevance of architecture to construct the present, the future, and the past in communities.
